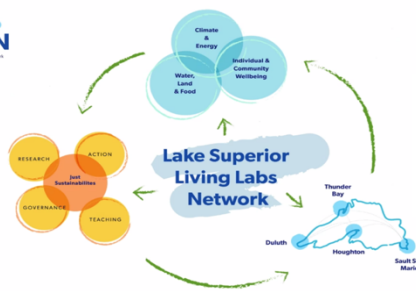


# Duluth Climate Action Field School

**Call for Artist-Participants:** The Duluth Hub of the Lake Superior Living Lab Network (LSSLN) is seeking 8 to 10 local artists who can participate and provide feedback on a pilot **Duluth Climate Action Fieldschool** to be held in October 2022 in Duluth. Artists will receive \$200 stipends to attend five fieldschool sessions lead by LSSLN members, local experts and activists. These sessions will explore challenges and opportunities related to the sectors of food, energy, water, and our collective social lives. Each session would include a meal with attendees/participants and teachers.

**In November, the Duluth Art Institute** will host a public conversation on *Climate Action & Art* lead by the artists who participated in the Fieldschool.

**Outcomes:** Artists who attend and participate in the Climate Action Fieldschool will gain solutions-oriented local knowledge about Climate Change and Action at a watershed scale. Artists may also propose and be solicited on further collaborative projects with Fieldschool teachers. LSSLN coordinators will pass along the Fieldschool’s curriculum design and lessons learned to a local Duluth-based community institution interested in hosting the next Duluth Climate Action Fieldschool in 2023.
